MINUTES The Community Foundation Distribution Committee March 14, 2025

Present: Danielle Montague, Richard Dixon, Sandy Saunders, Jerry Williams, Elizabeth Hurt, Tiffany Hairston, Cookie Edmunds, Angeles Atkinson via Zoom, Dan Hayes, Emily Tomlinson and Traci Petty

Not Present: Cathy Pulliam

Danielle Montague, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 3:13 pm. Ms. Montague welcomed everyone.

November 20, 2024, Distribution Committee Minutes – Ms. Montague presented the minutes from the November 20, 2024, Distribution Committee meeting. The minutes were approved on a Williams/Dixon motion with a unanimous vote.

Policy Review and Discussion – Traci Petty asked the committee if they had reviewed the drafts for the Scholarship and Due Diligence for Grantmaking Policies and had any questions. A discussion was held with an opening for questions about the changes and ultimately the proposed drafts were approved on a Dixon/Edmunds motion with a unanimous vote.

Grant Cycles Discussions and Voting -

Keokee Grant Cycle had \$2,239 available to spend on the cycle. There were four applicants with requests totaling \$16,234.57. The Distribution Committee members discussed the projects, and the amounts requested. Although it was difficult to decide between the projects the members were able to reach a decision to fund the Activ8 STEM Academy with Danville Public Schools their full request of \$1,592 and Danville Science Center a partial funding amount of \$649.

Autism Education Grant Cycle had \$5,824 available to spend on the cycle. There were two applicants with requests totaling \$7,000. The Distribution Committee members decided to grant Smokestack Theatre Company their full request at \$1,000 and Danville Science Center a partial funding amount of \$4,824.

Arts and Cultural Grant Cycle had \$6,163 available to spend on the cycle. There were two applicants with requests totaling \$7,000. The Distribution Committee members decided to award

Smokestack Theatre Company their full request at \$2,000 and The Haus of Fashion, Inc., a partial funding amount of \$4,163.

Marshall Family Fund Grant Cycle had \$95,983 available on the spending policy. Grace Design Church automatically receives 10% from the top equaling \$9,598 and The Community Foundation of the Dan River Region receives 5% from the top equaling \$4,799. The remainder of \$81,586 was available for the grant cycle applicants. There were three applicants this time with requests totaling \$57,000. The Distribution Committee decided full funding for Averett University at \$25,000; full funding for Blue Ridge Mountain Council-Boy Scouts at \$12,000; and decided that Grace Design Community Church would be awarded \$33,000 (the full cost of their paving project instead of the \$20,000 they requested.) As voted by the full Board of Directors two years ago, The Free Clinic of Danville Fund will receive the remainder left in the cycle at \$11,586.

March Distribution Report – Emily Tomlinson filled in the amounts decided for the four grant cycles (Keokee, Autism, Marshall and Arts and Culture) and provided copies to the Committee Chair. Ms. Montague asked the members if they had reviewed the pending March Distribution Report in the packet, agreed with the amounts entered for the grant cycles and were ready to vote on approval of the distribution. The Distribution Report was approved on a Dixon/Hairston motion with a unanimous vote.

Distribution Process Review and Discussion -

Grant and Scholarship Rubrics - Traci Petty explained that the staff made notes during the administrative reviews of both the grants and the scholarships about areas in the grading rubrics that could be made stronger. She reviewed the current rubrics with the Distribution Committee and asked that they think about some changes that might improve them. She explained that we would revisit this topic in our May meeting after the members have time to reflect on it.

Competitive Grant Cycle Application Structure - Traci Petty prepared pie-charts to reflect the amount of money awarded in each of our seven categories through the Competitive Grant Cycle. Discussion was had about whether we would like to add some additional structure around how we choose what to fund, if we would like to see some categories receive more support than in the past, and if we would like to add Halifax County to the cycle, even if in a limited capacity. She explained that this was another area for the members to reflect and we would approach final decisions at our May meeting.

Marshall Family Fund Structure – Traci Petty explained that as the 20-quarter average progresses, the Marshall Family Fund payout will increase exponentially. She made a list of ideas of how to expand the opportunity for the designated agencies and asked the Distribution Committee to think about it and to come back to the May meeting with additional ideas and be ready to make some decisions. Any changes to the process would necessitate meeting with the grantees to explain the changes and allow them to ask questions before the next cycle.

Next Meeting – Traci Petty reminded that the next Distribution Committee Meeting scheduled for Wednesday, May 7, 2025, at 3:00 pm.

There being no further business, the Chair, on a Hairston/Williams motion, declared the meeting adjourned at 5:00 pm.

Project Scope: 10 Point Section

Did the applicant include who the project will serve and indicate how large of an audience it will impact? 0-2 = Poor; 3-5 = Average; 6-8 = Good; 9-10 = Excellent (10 Point Question)

Other Considerations: 10 Point Section

Does the organization intend to collaborate with other groups to achieve the project goals/objectives? (This helps maximize the effectiveness of the resources) 0-2 = Poor; 3-5 = Average; 6-8 = Good; 9-10 = Excellent (10 Point Question)

- 1. Be ready to vote on the proposed changes to the Grant and Scholarship Rubrics.
- 2. Review and approve or edit a homeschool transcript template.
- 3. May we add a question to the CGC application asking if our applicants take advantage of local resources such as the Chamber of Commerce, River District Association or the Dan River Nonprofit Network, The Health Collaborative Community Assessment, The ALICE Report from United Way, the DRF Report Card?
- 4. Will we divide the funding for CGC into percentages for each category?
- 5. Do we want to focus on Community Development, Health and Wellness or Arts and Culture more with unrestricted money since these are the gaps that have been created by what donors have established funds to support? If yes, then I can do the research and report to the Committee about projects other communities like ours are doing and the impact it has created.
- 6. Do we want to put guidelines around organizations relying upon us for sustaining certain areas of their organization?
- 7. Do we want to provide incentive to bring us innovative projects?
- 8. Would we consider allowing organizations to apply for the \$10,000 needed to establish their own designated agency fund to support the areas they need help sustaining?
- 9. Would we consider allotting \$50,000 from the top of our unrestricted funding to serve Halifax in a more meaningful way?
- 10. Do we want to invite the Advisory Committee for the Fund for Halifax to join the Distribution Committee for the purpose of reviewing applications for Halifax agencies?
- 11. Please evaluate the following possible processes for the Marshall Family Trust application cycle and be prepared to vote for one of these as the new process or bring ideas for doing it a different way.
 - a. Prepare each organization that there is more money and they should increase the amount of their requests in the current one application they file.
 - b. Continue to allow the one application they already apply to us to receive and allow a second application for a larger project.
- 12. Would we want to develop a set of guidelines for doing multi-year funding for the Marshall applicants to implement in future years as this cycle matures with the 20 quarter average increases?
- 13. Be ready to vote yes or no whether the Marshall applicants will be removed from the Competitive Grant Cycle.






